Module Descriptor

Purpose: The purpose of this module is to equip the learner with the knowledge, skill and competence to communicate ideas using a range of painting techniques and media.

Module Duration: The learning effort required from a typical learner to successfully achieve the stated learning outcomes for the module is **100 hours.**

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this module, the learner will be able to:

- 1. Identify diverse painting traditions and media within a range of cultures.
- 2. Discuss the use of art elements and principles in specific preferred paint work.
- 3. Use the language of art history and appreciation with regard to a preferred artist's work.
- 4. Outline colour theory.
- 5. Explain the importance of the correct maintenance and storage of art materials and tools.
- 6. Use a variety of paint media experimentally.
- 7. Communicate a moderate range of ideas through paint using a variety of painting techniques.
- 8. Use art elements and principles in organising personal compositions and drawn studies.
- 9. Record a range of subjects from observation, including objects and life forms from the natural and manufactured environments and painting from life.
- 10. Communicate a broad range of ideas visually through painting, including appropriate primary and secondary source materials.
- 11. Select completed pieces for appropriate presentation.
- 12. Relate colour and paint to other craft areas.
- 13. Make a personal painted response to an idea or primary source material.





- 14. Evaluate critically own and others' work.
- 15. Apply appropriate health and safety procedures when working with paint materials and tools and within the studio.





Key Learning Points

Learning Outcome 1:

Identify diverse painting traditions and media within a range of cultures.

Key Learning Points

- Recognition of several different cultures that celebrate art (for example African, Japanese, Aboriginal, Mexican).
- Appreciation of the unique characteristics of each culture.
- The differences in approaches to painting traditions and media in each culture.

Learning Outcome 2:

Discuss the use of art elements and principles in specific preferred paint work.

Key Learning Points

- Awareness of other artists' work.
- The seven elements of art (line, shape, form, value, space, colour and texture).
- The eight principles of art (balance, proportion, unity, harmony, variety, emphasis, rhythm and movement).
- Identification and discussion of elements and principles in particular pieces of paint work.

Learning Outcome 3:

Use the language of art history and appreciation with regard to a preferred artist's work.

Key Learning Points

- Analysis of preferred artist's work, to include subject matter, form, colour, line/brushstrokes, composition.
- Artist's inspiration.
- Discussion of how a preferred artist's work developed and progressed over time.
- Artist's works in context of art movements.
- Personal responses to artist's work.

Learning Outcome 4:

Outline colour theory.

- Colour wheel (primary, secondary and tertiary colours).
- Colour harmony (analogous and complementary colours).
- The context of how colours are used (how colour behaves in relation to other colours and shapes).





Learning Outcome 5:

Explain the importance of the correct maintenance and storage of art materials and tools.

Key Learning Points

- Safe and proper storage of art materials.
- The importance of cleaning art materials and tools.
- The importance of art materials being properly labelled with contents and hazards.

Learning Outcome 6:

Use a variety of paint media experimentally.

Key Learning Points

- Experimentation with different paint materials available (for example watercolour, acrylic, oil, gouache, canvas, watercolour paper).
- Characteristics, properties and typical uses of the listed materials.
- Different painting methods (For example, glazing, dry brush, texture, wet on wet, sand painting)
- Limitations and requirements of the different painting materials.
- Manipulation of different paint mediums.

Learning Outcome 7:

Communicate a moderate range of ideas through paint using a variety of painting techniques.

Key Learning Points

- Interpretation of a range of ideas through different painting techniques.
- Different painting techniques to demonstrate self-expression and creativity in action.

Learning Outcome 8:

Use art elements and principles in organising personal compositions and drawn studies.

- Use of art elements and principles as a means to give structure and layout to personal compositions and drawn studies.
- Use of a viewfinder.
- Working out dimensions, angles and interrelations with other objects.
- Using measuring, scribbling and grids.
- Emphasising a focal point.
- Drawing methods such as line, shape, form, shading and perspective.





Learning Outcome 9:

Record a range of subjects from observation, including objects and life forms from the natural and manufactured environments and painting from life.

Key Learning Points

- Different objects and items from the natural and manufactured environment that inspire and interest.
- Still life using both natural and man-made forms.
- Life-drawing studies and paintings of the human figure.
- Examples of objects and life forms from natural and manufactured environments.
- Drawing and painting studies of the landscape.

Learning Outcome 10:

Communicate a broad range of ideas visually through painting, including appropriate primary and secondary source materials.

Key Learning Points

- Identification of a theme or ideas of interest.
- Process for gathering primary and secondary source materials that inspire and interest (for example artist notes and letters, artist works, information on art movements, poetry).
- Analysis of the source materials.
- Interpretation of ideas and inspiration from research through paint.

Learning Outcome 11:

Select completed pieces for appropriate presentation.

Key Learning Points

- Considered organisation and collection of work.
- Planning and layout of the work.
- Portfolio of selected work showing a competent level of painting skills.

Learning Outcome 12:

Relate colour and paint to other craft areas.

- Integration of processes of paint and colour into other craft areas (for example in printmaking, ceramics and textiles).
- Use of colour and painting in three-dimensional forms.





Learning Outcome 13:

Make a personal painted response to an idea or primary source material.

Key Learning Points

- Viewing the process of painting as a tool to articulate your personal response to an idea or primary source material.
- Use of paint as a drawing/mark-making medium to express personal ideas, feelings and thoughts.
- Application of best paint medium according to source material.
- Development of one's individual style.

Learning Outcome 14:

Evaluate critically own and others' work.

Key Learning Points

- Critical evaluation.
- Samples of work for critical evaluation.
- Peer group discussions.
- Reviewing historical and contemporary painting.
- Visits to exhibitions or other resources such as the Internet and books to source work for critical evaluation.

Learning Outcome 15:

Apply appropriate health and safety procedures when working with paint materials and tools and within the studio.

- Good work practice when working with paint materials and tools in a studio.
- Awareness of dangerous paint materials and tools, and correct methods of handling them.
- Protective clothing and gloves.
- Safe disposal of toxic painting materials.
- Appropriate ventilation within the work area.
